Parable: An example. *Specifically*, a usually short, fictitious story that illustrates a moral attitude or a religious principle

Jesus shares many parables with his followers and disciples. Through these parables he demonstrates for us the wisdom of heaven and the truth of God the Father.

Matthew 4:2: He taught them many things by parables, and in his teaching said: "Listen!..." Did

you notice that last word? (Hint: The one highlighted.)

Listen.

Jesus is announcing *take heart, notice what I'm about to say because it's of great importance.* In this particular portion of Matthew's gospel he goes on to share the parable of the sower.

Mark 4:1-8 Again Jesus began to teach by the lake. The crowd that gathered around him was so large that he got into a boat and sat in it out on the lake, while all the people were along the shore at the water's edge. He taught them many things by parables, and in his teaching said: Listen! A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky

places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up,

the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants, so that they up quickly, did not bear grain. Still other seed fell on good soil. It came up, grew and produced a crop, some multiplying thirty, some sixty, some a hundred times."

My thoughts...

You may be familiar with this parable or it may be completely new to you. It is the parable Jesus told to illustrate the Word of God, and how it is received by... us. Yep, plain old people like you and me. The seed represents the word of God and the soil represents each person who hears it. What part of this parable resonates most with you? Has the Word of God fallen onto rocky soil in your life? Shallow soil? Was it choked out by weeds or eaten by birds? Has it fallen onto good soil?


Culture: The set of shared attitudes, values, goals and practices that characterize an institution or organization.


The story of Impervious is also a parable. In the first book, Lone Wolf, we see *parallels of heaven and earth--open air versus the underground city of Impervious*.

Forfeiture: Relinquishment; loss; giving up

One particular cultural norm inside of Impervious is the practice of Esteemed Forfeiture. Fran refers to the forfeitures as 'sellouts.' Another word to describe the word sellout would be unfaithful. Why do you think she feels this way? In other words, who/what does Fran feel the forfeitures are being unfaithful to?

Hopelessness can often lead to depression and even actions that may seem senseless. (As in Esteemed Forfeiture.) In the Old Testament, the book of Job is filled with the laments of a man who had come to the end of his rope.

Job was spoken of by God himself as "blameless and upright, a man who fears God and shuns evil." He was wealthy. He had a loving wife and many children. Yet, Job came to a season in his life where he lost everything that gave him joy. At one point, he was even ready to throw in the towel and wished he had never been born.

Job 6:2-4"If only my anguish could be weighed and all my misery be placed on the scales! It . would surely outweigh the sand of the seas—no wonder my words have been impetuous. The arrows of the Almighty are in me, my spirit drinks in their poison; God's terrors are marshaled against me."

What unexpected surprise does Fran find inside of the reader?



After reading more of Diary of a First Gen, Fran reflects back onto two very different cybernetic experiences: Both were holographic representations of the outside world: One experience was a picture of how a healed earth may appear with butterflies and green grass. The other,

Luke 1:1-4 Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eyewitnesses and servants of the word. We also are given conflicting stories of what lies beyond the grave here on planet earth. Sometimes these conflicting points of view rattle our brains, fill us with fear, or even worse make us ignore the inevitable. So what is the truth? How do we know?

Fran was pointed to the truth of what lay beyond Impervious by the reader she discovered. At first she is skeptical, but throughout the story, we see her skepticism give way to hope and finally true belief.

A key factor Fran's eventual belief was the fact that the story was written by a real man. One who had experienced the outside world as well as the world of Impervious, not to mention the additional words from her very own mentor. That was good news in her world Did you know the word "Gospel" actually means *good news*?

That is why the story of Christ is often referred to as *The Gospel*. It is is the good news that points us to heaven.



The open air is safe... Heaven is for real

A very poignant moment for Fran is when she realizes there is a portal to the open air.


Yee-ha! A way out! Knowing this revives her spirit of hope and spurs her on to search for more. That is good news, indeed.

Although our biblical Gospel--good news--involves several components, the component that correlates with Fran's story in particular is the truth that the kingdom of heaven is real. It is not a fairytale to dream of and some intangible hope. And not only is it real, it is near.

Matthew 4:17 From that time on Jesus began to preach, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

Jesus shares visions of the kingdom of heaven through parables:

Matthew 13:3-32 He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches."

Matthew 13:44 "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field.

Matthew 13:45-46 Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls. When he found one of great value, he went away and sold everything he had and bought it.

Not only do we see that we will be reunited with everyone who believed on the truth, but Jesus is alive! He sits on his throne in heaven and invites us all to join him in his kingdom.

Who is victorious? Those who have faith to believe that Jesus, our Messiah, came from Heaven to earth, died for our sins, resurrected and awaits each one of us in His kingdom.
